THE LATE PRESHET

Has carried off two bridges near town, on the Gut and on Shamokin creek. One of them had been carried away three or four times before. Why is this? Shall 1 tell you? The Railroad bridge, over the Gut has now been there nearly 20 years, and the reason is, that between the abutments there are 72 feet, and the bridge is sufficiently high, to allow all the water and ice to pass during the frequent freshets which we have in the Susquehanna. And until we build bridges which have the same advantages, we may expect to be called on frequently to rebuild them. The bridge, at the gut is a particularly useless narrow thing. It becomes quite covered -and of course impassable, at a very moderate rise of water. Its narrowness will ever prevent the water from passing. An additional span ought to be added-making use of the eastern abutment, as a pier. And from the end of the bridge, there ought to be an embankment to the foot of the hill. The earth for this purpose, may be had, in part, from the excavation necessary for the eastern abutment.
