RAILROAD SWITCHES.

John M. Crosland, of Pottsville, Pa., whom re know as a capable mechanic, writes on he subject of Railway Switches, the fatal occidents caused by their mismanagement, and the means of preventing those accidents, is follows:

But a small proportion of the employees on Railroad are possessed of that cool discernment and action that a momenntary fit of excitement may not bewilder; and the thought of trying a man for his life, or committing him to prison for a weakness beyond nis mastery, is cruel in the extreme. Let those who judge so rashly of a switch tender's fault when he makes a mistake, place themselves in that position, and try the infirmities of their own organization, and they will soon learn to deplore the general want of presence of mind under sudden emergency. I propose to take the chances of their mis-

takes entirely out of their hands as follows On any railroad using my "Switch Monitors" -be it the Central, Hudson River or the Great Pacific-the engineer, at starting his train, shall set his "guide monitor" centre. and every switch-tender on the road may turn their switches the wrong way purposely, and they cannot take the train from the main track ! There is yet another feature of my inven-

tion, less expensive, and which comes within my limited means. I allude to "Proof Monitors"-an index at all times of the position of the switch-which is plainly discernible to the engineer full five hundred yards from the switch. By this arrangement engineers are enabled to check up and alarm, if it be wrong ; or, being right, they may tap their bell in acknowledgement to prevent a change, and pass on in safety.
