OPERATOR.

CHOLERA has appeared at Nashville, Tenn., causing sixteen deaths in two days. A number of fatal cases of the same disease also took place last week at Cincinnati. In New York city, last week, there were twelve fatal cases of cholera. One hundred cases of cholera were under medical treatment a few days ago at the New York Quarantine, and on Sunday, the ship Charles Crocker arrived there from Liverpool which had thirty-one deaths on board of cholera during the voyage.

EFFECTS OF CHEAP FAIRS.—Three steamships left N. Y., on Monday, taking probably between fifteen hundred and two thousand passengers bound for California. We understand that the price of through steamer tickets by these vessels was but thirty five dollars, which accounts for the immense influx of emigrants.

Cholera items are becoming frequent in the Western papers. The Mayville, Ky. Eagle of the 31st inst., says: "We learn from the officers of the steamer Kenton, that up to Thursday noon, there had been sixteen cases and eight or nine deaths of cholera, at Portsmouth, during the present week."

Philadelphia Market. June 11, 1854. FLOUR AND MEAL.—The market is dull, and flour is lower. Small sales at \$3 75 per barrel for standard brands, and \$9 37 1/2 for extra. We quote Rye Flour at \$5, and Pennsylvania Corn Meal at \$3 75 per bbl. GRAIN.—Wheat is scarce, and holders generally ask \$2 18 for white and \$2 02 for red per bushel. Rye continues scarce. Last sales of Pennsylvania at \$1 15. Corn is scarce, and yellow is in demand at \$3 8 1/2 cts. Oats are scarce—last sale at 54 cts. WHISKEY is held at 28 cts. in barrels, and hogheads at the same price.

Baltimore Market. June 13, 1854. GRAIN.—The steamer's news has had a depressing influence upon the market, and prices this morning were generally lower.—The receipts of wheat at market quite light, and it is probable they will continue so until the new crop comes in. We quote today's fair to prime reds at 185 1/2 cts., and fair to prime whites at 190 1/2 cts., and Corn Yellow in fair demand and we note sales at 75 1/2 cts. We quote Pennsylvania Rye today at 110 1/2 cts. in barrels, and receipts of Oats were about 2500 bushels. We note sales of 1500 bushels inferior Virginia at 54 cts.—Prime Virginia and Maryland Oats would bring 56 1/2 cts. Pennsylvania Oats were held at 60 1/2 cts. We note sales this morning at 60 cts.
