Under its harmonious wording, a Republic has grown op in an ordinary lifetime, that would have taken any other system of government a thousand years to have brought about. Yes, in less, time than it takes some green-house plants to arrive at maturity, we have built a nation that has spread from Maine to Mexico, and from the Atlantic to the Pacific -a nation that has caught more whales licked more Mexicans, planted more telegraphic posts, and owns more sleamboats, than any other nation that has ever lived, or ever will live."

MURDER OF SIX CHILDREN BY THE FOR-MER NURSE OF THE PRINCE OF WALES.
