First I saw the Sultan so much exhilarated by the occasion, as actually to put his horse upon the gallep, a thing quite incompatible with the dignity of the Sultan ! Second, the lady of Marshal St. Arnaud drove in her carriage directly in front of the Sultan, and was there introduced to him, he coming foward on his horse to speak with her; a stranger proceeding, and even more revolting to the feelings of rigid Musselmen, than it was to see Lord Stratford help their Imperial Master into his boat on the day of the English review ! And last of all, and to cap the climas, I saw a Turkish young lady walking, arm in arm, with a Torkish gentleman! a sight, so far as I know, entirely new for Turkey. He may have been her husband, for aught I know, but, according to Turkish notions, that would not mend the matter in the least. Strictly, a husband cannot with any propriety allow his wife even to walk by his side in the street. Rarely are they seen to go out together at all, and when they do, the wife must keep a respeciful distance behind!

Up to this day, green is a sacred color with the Turks, and no Christian subject is allowed, on any account to wear it. It is a distinctive mark of a Mossulman, and especially, and above all things else, in the turban-Green turbaned Turks, even, are rare, and it is understood that the men who aspire to such a distinction is a peculiarly holy man-indeed, a lineal descendant of the Prophet. Just imagine, then, what must be the feelings of the good old Mussulman, to see regiments of French troops all wearing the green turban! These soldiers have gone through all the streets of the capital, sometimes singly, MILLINERY ESTABLISHMENT! sometimes in companies of five and ten, and have attracted universal attention and remark. At first the common Turks supposed them to be Mussulmen Frenchmen. Several of them were passing St. Sophia one day, and some Turks invited them to go in and say their prayers. The Frenchmen, not knowing the language, did not at first comprehend the her customers and friends, with all kinds of nature of the invitation; but a person was soon found to act as interpreter. When they learned that they were expected to go through the Mussulmen prayers, 'Why,' said they, 'we are Catholic Christians, not Mussulmans? 'How then,' said the other, 'do you wear these turbans !' 'O,' replied they, 'we wear whatever color we like.'

THE HOMESTEAD GRADUATION LAND BILL failed in the recent Congress, but it turns out that a graduation bill of much more importance, offered by Mr. Cobb, passed both houses, and became a law. The Union gives the following synopsis of its provisions:

"All lands which have been in market for ten years or upwards shall be subject to entry at one dollor per acre; fifteen years and upwaeds, at seventy-five cents; twenty years and upwards, at fifty cents; and twenty-five years and upwards, at twenty-five cents; and thirty years and upwards, at twelve and a half cents per acre. Upon every reduction the occupant and settler to have the right of pre-emption at such graduation prices until within thirty days preceding the next graduation, but not to interfere with any right which has heretofore occuped to actual set tlers. Any person applying to enter any of the aforesaid lands is required to make affidavit that he or she enters the same for his or her own use, and for the purpose of actual settlement and cultivation, or for the use of an adjoining farm owned or occupied by him or her self, and that, together with such entry, he or she has not acquired from the United States, under the provisions of this act, more than three hundred and twenty acres

THE FOLLOWING ACT, "Relative to the Revival of Judgments before Justices of the Peace," was passed by the late Legislature, and approved May 5th 1854 :

SECT. 1 .- That from and after the passage of this Act no execution shall be issued on a judgment rendered before a Justice of the Pease or Alderman, after five years from the rendition of such judgment, unless the same shall have been revived by scire facies of amicable confession.

IRON MOUNTAIN RAILROAD .-- We learn from the St. Louis Republican that official instructions have been received from the General Office at Washington, by the Register of the Land Office in that city, to withdraw from entry all lands along the line of the "Iron Mountain and Mississippi Railroad." These instructions have been issued by the President, at the instance of the delegation in Congress from the State of Missouri.

Commonwealth. Secreen 1. Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments be and the same are hereby proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, under and in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article hereof, to wit:

Parfosition 1, to se anticle xi.

Section 1. Section 2 To pay the public debt of the Commonwealth, and debts which may becaster be contracted in case of war to repel invasion, suppress insurrection and to redeem the public debt, the Legislature shall at their next session after the adoption of this section into the Constitution, provide by law for the creation of a sinking finel, which shall not be abolished till the estimptotic debts be wholly paid, to consist of all the net animal income from the public works and stocks owned by the Commonwealth, er any other funds arising miler any revenue law may existing or that may be hereafter enacted, so far as the same may be required to pay the interest of said debts semi-annually, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than five hundred themand dollars, increased yearly by compounding at a faits of not less than five percentum per annuar; the soid sinking fund shall be invested in the kans of the Commonwealth, which shall be cancelled from time to time in a manner to be provided by law in particin of the sinking fund shall ever be applied to the to the payment of the debt of five hundred thousand dollars mentioned in the first section of this particle, but the said sinking fund shall be applied only to the purposes herein specified.
