EX-PRESIDENT WALKER GOING TO NI CARAGUA.

(From the San Francisco Herald, February 28 J Colonel Wm. Walker has, we understand received a grant of fifty-two thousandneres of land from the government of Nicaragua, and intends to sail about the 10th of March f the Port of Realejo. The grant has a contion of colonization annexed, and the grante proposes to convey one hundred and fit

Nicaragua.
This is the first step towards a proper developement of the immense natural resources of the Nicaragua Isthmus. The territory is extremely fertile, yielding large and abundant crops of cotton, sugar, coffee, cocoa, tohacco, indigo, maize, wheat and rice Rich mines are also said to exist in the State, and the Indians in their rude way have long worked the gold placers of the northeastern departments. The climate is excellent, especially on the Pacific side and among the uplands north and east of Lake Mangua and Nicaragua. Labor is cheap and abundant; and all that

is required to make the country wealthy is a firm and staple government. It is probably with a view of giving peace to the people and of establishing in the State a nucleus of law and order, that the grant has been made to Col. Walker. The accomplishment of such un end will be a great good, not only to the State of Nicaragua, but to the commerce and civilization of the world.
