Farmer's Department.

LIME IN AGRICULTURE

Professor Johnson says, "the offects of lime are greatest when well mixed with the reach of the atmosphere. Its value is greater upon newly plowed arable surface soils. Such table and other organic matter, hence the rule that lime ought always to precede putfor cultivation. It produces a greater proportional improvement on poor soils in their natural state, than on such as are richer; as naturally poor soils contain a greater or less destitute of lime. On the other hand, on poor arable lands which have been worn out by repeated liming and cropping, it does no good whatever, as such soils, if they do not already abound in lime, are generally destitute of other kinds of foot, organic and inorganic, by which healthy plants are nourished, and they can only be restored to fertility by a judicious mixture of all. On all lands in which vegetable matter is wanting, lime may even do harm to the immediate cross A even do harm to the immediate crops. A consideration of the circumstances above adverted to are sufficient to induce the en-tire abandonment of it. Where soil has been impoverished through its unskilful application, or by large admixtures of lime and marl for a series of years, new additions are a waste of material and labor. When natural causes have removed the super-abundance, and produced an accumulation of those other substances which, when associated with lime. increase the productiveness of the soil, its use may be resumed."

PEACH TREES AND TANSY .- A writer in the New York Times recommends the sowthe New York Times recommends the sowing of Tansy about the roots of peach trees,
as a means of preserving them. He says
that he once knew a large peach tree which
was more than forty years old, while several
generations of similar trees in the same soil,
had passed away. This led to an examination and a bed of tansy was discovered about the trunk. It was naturally inferred that the preservation of this tree to such a green old sge was attributed to the presence of this plant. It was decided to try experiments on others, and accordingly a few of the roots were placed about each of the other trees on the premises, some of which gave signs of decay. Not only has it preserved for several years the sound trees, but renovated those that were ansound. —The oder of the plant, he says, doubtiess keeps off the insect enemies of this kind of tree, and i might have the same effect on others, as the plum, apple and pear, as well as the clm, sycamore, and othe ornamental trees.

LIME ON CORN,-Mr. R. F. Bingham, of Ohio, communicates to the Southern Cultivafor, the following experiment he made with lime upon young corn. It is the first time we ever heared of a similar application, and we imagine that the increased crop, in consequence, did not more than cover the expense ... | Ed.

He says—"I have just concluded an ex-periment with lime on a field of corn, which may be worthy of notice- As the corn was coming up, I applied about half a pint of slacked lime to each hill, with the exception of four rows near the middle of the field, which were left that I might see whether or no liming in the hill was beneficial to the crop.-Then after treatment was the same during the season. Harvested separately the four rows unlimed, and also adjoining them four that were limed (soll and situation being precisely the same) and the result was an increase of a little over one-eighth in the amount of corn in favor of that which was
