matter, and if the soil to which it is applied is destitute of composable matter, then it cannot benefit the crop for the time being.

Let ue one say he is too poor to lime and improve his farm, for if he continues to adhere to his old practice of robbing the fields of all its fertilizing qualities, and not make suitable returns, he will become poorer still. Just begin at one field, manure lime and clover, and if his hare week will not visit a sufficient and if his barn yard will not yield a sufficient supply of manure, make compost, then he will see and behold with his own eyes that his money has been profitably invested, and he will follow it up until his whole farm has become regenerated. Those fields that now are a barren waste will be productive and profitable. "It is so expensive to line," is often asserted by the cautious farmer. I will say anto him that if he embarks in it properly, he will find it more expensive and labo-rious than he anticipates. He will be under the necessity of paying much for hired labor to assist him in gathering his crops, of buying threshing machines to thresh out his grain which now is performed by flails. He must tear down his old barn and build a larger one, erect sheds to shelter his numerous cattle. stack hay and grain in the field, and have it exposed to the weather and injured by the

FRUIT ORCHARD

Planting trees in this section can be done during this month. Select the best varieties of fruit trees, and plant apple trees from \$5 to 40 fest apart; peach, pear, plans, and cherry trees 20 feet apart: dwarf pears from 10 to 12 feet apart. Grafting may be done this month. Prepare grafting wax by mixing three parts of bees-wax, three parts of resin. and two of tallow.

Plant out gooseberry and current cuttings, first removing all the lower eyes. Treach and prepare the ground with short manner. Grape vine cuttings should be planted with two eyes out of the ground, and in a soil ra-ther sandy and moist. Trim grape vines at nee, if not already done, and dig in around the roots, well rotted manure. Strip of all trees cocoons and larvar of insects, and apply wash before recommended.
