Hogs.-Give them occasionally a tablespoonfull of a compound, three parts ashes and one of salt, for each hog, mixed with their food, and it will destroy the kidney worms.—
For costiveness, with which they are often affected, take copperas, pulverised and put it in a skillet, and put it ever a quick fire; it will soon boil; then stir it till well mixed. and take it off to cool; then pulverise it, and give to each hog a tablespoonfull as often as the excrement shows them to be costive. - It can be mixed with milk, or other food.

Fry them brown, and send them to table hot. In taste they will be found to have a singular resemblance to fried oysters, and universally liked if properly done. They make nice side dishes at dinner, and are very good at breakfast .- Farmer and Mechanic.

To Make Good Apple Jelly.—Take apples of the best quality and good flavor, not sweet,] cut them in quarters or slices, and stew them till soft; then strain out the juice, being very careful not to let any of the pulp go through the strainer. Boil it to the con sistency of molasses, then weigh it and add as many pounds of crushed sugar, stirring it constantly till the sugar is dissolved. Add one ounce of extract of lemon to every twenty pounds of jelly, and when cold, set it away in close jars. It will keep good for years.—
Those who have not made jelly in this way will do well to try it; they will find it superi or to currant jelly.—Michigan Farmer.

Temperance Vinegar .- I took watermelons scraped off the pulp, strained it through a thick cloth, and boiled it down one-half, or as old cider boilers would say, two to one; put it in a cask, and three weeks I had most ex-cellent vinegar; and it has continued to improve with age. Preserving a Green Color in Vegetables While Cooking.—It is recommended to add a small quantity of soda to the water in which the "greens," &c., are being cooked, to prethe "greens," &c., are being cooked, to pre-serve their beautiful green color—say an even teaspoonfull or less, to two quarts of water. It appears reasonable that this result should be preduced, since the alkali (soda) will neutralise any vegetable acid present which would redden the green color. As the soda would mostly remain in the liquor, and this is thrown away, no harm can result from this is thrown away, no harm can result from its use.—(American Agriculturalist.

To Make Hair Oil.—Take one quart of clive oil, or fine lard oil, 24 ounces of spirits of wise, 1 ounce of cinnamon powder, five drachms of bergamot. Heat them together in a large pipkin, then remove it from the fire, and add four small pieces of alkanet root; keep it closely covered for six hours, let it then be filtered through a funnel lined with blotting or filtering paper.
