

AMERICAN NATIONAL CONVENTION.

This body assembled on Monday morning pursuant to adjournment. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Campbell, of Tenn. The consideration of the proposed Platform offered by Mr. Small on Saturday, and all kindred propositions, were laid on the table.

Mr. Brownlow, of Tenn., moved that the Convention proceed at once to make nominations for candidates for President and Vice President of the United States, and called the previous question, which was sustained.

The main question was then taken by yeas and nays, and decided in the affirmative by a vote in favor of 131, against 51. Much time was as usual consumed by members giving reasons for their votes.

Mr. Stewart of Penna., then nominated Hon. Millard Fillmore, of New York, for President, and Andrew Jackson Donelson, of Tenn., for Vice President.

Mr. Sly, of Maryland, nominated the Hon. Wm. H. Smith, of Alabama, for Vice President. Mr. Perkins, of Connecticut, spoke at length, and insisted upon a restoration of the Missouri Compromise as the ultimatum of American platform.

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The nominations as made were Millard Fillmore, of N. Y., John C. Fremont, of Cal., Sam. Houston, of Texas, Erastus Brooks, of N. Y., Garret Davis, of Ky., Kenneth Raynor, of N. C., John M. Clayton, of Del.

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EMERGENCY EXTRAORDINARY.

Yesterday, between the hours of breakfast and dinner, a runaway couple were captured in New Albany by the strong arm of a police officer and an assistant, and their liberty most ignominiously entailed by lodging them in our jail.

The particulars of this man's negro stealing affair are about these. The white man was deeply enamored of the black cook, and, no doubt, persuaded her to run away, having before hand provided a couple of through tickets over the New Albany railroad to Michigan City, which tickets were subsequently found in his possession.

The officers and others then returned to New Albany, and after a short search found the white man in a cellar, captured and lodged him in jail, and he will now be arraigned on the sweet charge of negro stealing.

The Convention then adjourned to 5 o'clock. The morning having made the general nominations by calls of the several States, the first business of the afternoon session was to fix upon the plan of taking the votes for the final nomination.
