No witness is obliged to appear or to give testimony, unless he does so at his own option, and even if he swears

falsely, there is no statute penalty.

Without the means of proving the practical working of his machine, or without any other legal testimony, the inventor sometimes provides himself with a few certificates, or exparte affidavits, sometimes of doubtful authenticity, and always regarded with suspicion, and presents himself before the office. rejected, appeals to the judge-who has no adequate means of arriving at a correct conclusion—and thus is frequently deprived of his rights without an opportunity tablishing them in the manner guaranteed to tured. all other citizens.

Nor ought it to be supposed that these are matters of trivial moment; at least they are not so to the individual most immediately interested.
