Governor Gardner presided, assisted by 40 Vice Presidents, including the most distinguished men of all parties. Among the Mayor Rice, Mr. Baker, President of the Senate, Mr. Phelps, Speaker of the House, Ex-Governor Boutwell, Hon. Samuel Walley, Ex-Mayor Smith, Hon. Nathan Hale, Editor of the Daily Advertiser, Amos A. Lawrence, Professor C. C. Fellon and Lyman Beecher. The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. Rollin H. Neal. Gov. Gardner, on taking the chair made a stirring speech, characterizing the assault on Senator Sumner as an exhibition of grossness and brutality, exceeding anything written on the pages of history, and calling upon Congress to expel the assailants from its Halls.

The Governor's sentiments were responded to by tremendous cheerings throughout.

Judge Russell followed with a series of

revolutions. The meeting was afterwards addressed by John C. Pack, George S. Hilliard, E. C. Biker, Chas. A. Phelps, Samuel B. Walley, Col. Brewster, Peter W. Chandler, and John A. Andrew, representing all the political parties. Many of the speeches were unusually warm and defiant eliciting, in their prominent points, most tumultuous responses.

The following are the resolutions: --Resolved, That we have heard with grief and indignation of the brutal assault committed upon our esteemed Senator, Charles sists in part of for words spoken in debate, and of Black & Fancy Broadcloths & Cassimeres, the insult offered in his person to the honor

of our Commonwealth. Resolved, That in this outrage we see new encroachments upon freedom, new violations of State rights and a strange disregard of ebicalrons princip es, while in the conduct of such men as Senator Crittenden we gladly recognize proofs of the fact that in all sec tions of the country there are men of high kenor, of pure principles and of true patriot-

Resolved. That this attack is to be re buked not only as a cowardly assault upon a defenceless man; but as a crime against the right of free speech and the dignity of a free

Le. olved. That, as American citizens, we deeply lament the odium which such acts cast upon our country and upon the cause of Republicanism throughout the world.

Resolved, That although sixty-eight mem hers of the national House of Representa-tives have voted that, they think no inquiry egarding the outrage is necessary, still we orl confident that Congress will free itself from the same crime, by expelling the offen-der from the seat which he has disgraced. Resolved. That we regard every blow ufficted upon our Senator as a blow nimed at us : that in our estimation his wounds are conorable wounds; that as citizens of Mes achusetts, without distinction of party, we ledge him here, in old Faneuil Hall, our ympathy and support in the fearless and in-

lependent discharge of his duty. The resolutions were passed unanimously and the meeting adjourned at 11 o'clock Many ladies occupied the galleries, and large elegations were in attendance from the

eighboring towns.
