Brocks is a member of this House, they cannot arrest, and a fortion, cannot try to publish him for a breach of their privileges; that they cannot proceed farther in the case than to make their complaint to this House, and that the tower to arrest, try and punish devalves solely on this body; and whereas, upor m full investigation, it appears to this House that the said Preston S. Several blows passed between them and they wer parted, without being satisfied, however. They again went to work in a pugilistic manner, and were a second time parted and the encounter terminated. There was but little blood lost in the convest, notwithstanding Mr. Small was scratched or cut in the face, and the injuries inflated in either side were trifling.

These two gentlemen, it will be remember. ed, are contestants for the position of Brigadier General of the Second Brigade. Mr Tyler Laving on his side, as is alleged, the ersion of Generals Patterson and Cadwalader and the Supreme Court, while Governor Pollock and the Attorney General of the State are on the side of Mr. Small. On Saturday last Mr. S. was summoned to appear before the Supreme Court, at Harrisburg, to show by what right he continued to act as Brigadier General.
