Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of

the Commonwealth, RESOLVED BY THE SKNATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA IN GENERAL ASCIMETY MET. That the following amendments are proposed to the causatintum of the commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof. FIRST AMENDMENT. There simil be an additional article to said ecobe designated as artitle eleven, as follows:—

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

ARTICLE XI.

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

Section 1. The state may contract debta, to supply casual deficits or failures in tevennes, or to meet expenses too to heavise provided for; lut the nagregate amount of such debta direct and contingent, whether contracted by vitue of one or mere acts of the general assembly, or at different peri sk of time, shall never exceed seven handred and fifty thousant d flars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Section 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts for each invasion, suppress immerection, slefent the state in war, or to redeeth the present onteraching insleft does of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts shall be applied to no other purpose whatever.

Section 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no debt whatever shall be created by, or on behalf of the state.

Section 4.
