BOROUGH ORDINANCE.

An Ordinance to provide for the paving of the side-walks and crossings in Shamokin or Market street in the Borough of Sunbury, so far as the same may be required, and to make and publish the same.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Burgess, Assistant Burgess and Common Councilmen of the Borough of Sunbury, in Common Council met, and it is hereby Ordained by authority of the same:

SECTION 1. That the owner or owners of lots lying on the northern and southern sides of Market or Shamokin street, between Broadway and the canal known as the Gut, in said Borough, shall before the first day of September, 1857, lay down and construct opposite their lot a sidewalk on said street called Market or Shamokin, a good and substantial pavement laid in a workman like manner, of bricks, flag stones or planks, in the manner hereinafter prescribed.

SECTION 2. That the width of the pavement shall be as follows: in Market Square they shall extend twelve feet from the line or front of the lot, and in the other part of said street, they shall extend ten feet from the line or front of the same, except where there is no building erected the width shall be five feet measuring from the outside line of either pavements inward, and if hereafter a building is erected on said except part, the pavement shall be of full width.

SECTION 3. The grade of the pavement shall be as follows: in Market Square they shall extend twelve feet from the line or front of the lot, and in the other part of said street, they shall extend ten feet from the line or front of the same, except where there is no building erected the width shall be five feet measuring from the outside line of either pavements inward, and if hereafter a building is erected on said except part, the pavement shall be of full width.

SECTION 4. That if the owner or owners of the aforesaid lot or lots or any of them, shall fail to comply with the requirements of this Ordinance, it shall be the duty of the High Constable and he is hereby authorized and directed, to make or cause to be made, the said pavements in the manner aforesaid, and to keep an accurate account, which account shall be verified by him under oath of the costs of the same and cause said account to be filed in the Court of Common Pleas of Northumberland County, in the name of the Burgesses and inhabitants of the Borough of Sunbury, to be paid to the Borough Treasurer. And it shall be the duty of the High Constable to tear up such pavement and relay it according to the grade and dimensions as fixed as aforesaid, at the expense of the party so offending.

SECTION 5. That if the owner or owners of the aforesaid lot or lots or any of them, shall fail to comply with the requirements of this Ordinance, it shall be the duty of the High Constable and he is hereby authorized and directed, to make or cause to be made, the said pavements in the manner aforesaid, and to keep an accurate account, which account shall be verified by him under oath of the costs of the same and cause said account to be filed in the Court of Common Pleas of Northumberland County, in the name of the Burgesses and inhabitants of the Borough of Sunbury, to be paid to the Borough Treasurer. And it shall be the duty of the High Constable to tear up such pavement and relay it according to the grade and dimensions as fixed as aforesaid, at the expense of the party so offending.

SECTION 6. That the Supervisors of said Borough are hereby authorized and directed, at the points where the side-walks on each side of Market street, aforesaid intersect River, Penn and Fawn streets, and also at the intersections of said side-walks with alleys, to raise the crossings and pave the same with stone of not less than one foot in thickness by six inches in the square, said crossings to be four feet wide on the top and sufficient space on each side for the easy passage of vehicles, and the Supervisors are hereby authorized and directed to pave in the manner above directed, the crossing at Market and Broadway, the crossing on Market street at the western end of Market square, the crossing at the eastern end of Market square, and the crossing at the intersection of Market and Fawn streets, the whole to be completed before the first day of September, A. D. 1857.

On motion, This Ordinance passed by the following vote:

BOROUGH ORDINANCE.

An Ordinance to provide for the paving of the side-walks and crossings in Shamokin or Market street in the Borough of Sunbury, so far as the same may be required, and to make and publish the same.

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Burgess, Assistant Burgess and Common Councilmen of the Borough of Sunbury, in Common Council met, and it is hereby Ordained by authority of the same:

SECTION 1. That the owner or owners of lots lying on the northern and southern sides of Market or Shamokin street, between Broadway and the canal known as the Gut, in said Borough, shall before the first day of September, 1857, lay down and construct opposite their lot a sidewalk on said street called Market or Shamokin, a good and substantial pavement laid in a workman like manner, of bricks, flag stones or planks, in the manner hereinafter prescribed.

SECTION 2. That if the owner or owners of the aforesaid lot or lots or any of them, shall fail to comply with the requirements of this Ordinance, it shall be the duty of the High Constable and he is hereby authorized and directed, to make or cause to be made, the said pavements in the manner aforesaid, and to keep an accurate account, which account shall be verified by him under oath of the costs of the same and cause said account to be filed in the Court of Common Pleas of Northumberland County, in the name of the Burgesses and inhabitants of the Borough of Sunbury, to be paid to the Borough Treasurer. And it shall be the duty of the High Constable to tear up such pavement and relay it according to the grade and dimensions as fixed as aforesaid, at the expense of the party so offending.

SECTION 3. That if the owner or owners of the aforesaid lot or lots or any of them, shall fail to comply with the requirements of this Ordinance, it shall be the duty of the High Constable and he is hereby authorized and directed, to make or cause to be made, the said pavements in the manner aforesaid, and to keep an accurate account, which account shall be verified by him under oath of the costs of the same and cause said account to be filed in the Court of Common Pleas of Northumberland County, in the name of the Burgesses and inhabitants of the Borough of Sunbury, to be paid to the Borough Treasurer. And it shall be the duty of the High Constable to tear up such pavement and relay it according to the grade and dimensions as fixed as aforesaid, at the expense of the party so offending.

SECTION 4. That the Supervisors of said Borough are hereby authorized and directed, at the points where the side-walks on each side of Market street, aforesaid intersect River, Penn and Fawn streets, and also at the intersections of said side-walks with alleys, to raise the crossings and pave the same with stone of not less than one foot in thickness by six inches in the square, said crossings to be four feet wide on the top and sufficient space on each side for the easy passage of vehicles, and the Supervisors are hereby authorized and directed to pave in the manner above directed, the crossing at Market and Broadway, the crossing on Market street at the western end of Market square, the crossing at the eastern end of Market square, and the crossing at the intersection of Market and Fawn streets, the whole to be completed before the first day of September, A. D. 1857.
