RESOLUTION

Proposing Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth. RESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPERSENTATIVES OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVATIA IN GENERAL ASSESSED MET, That the following amendments are proposed to the constitution of the commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof

FIRST AMENDMENT. There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article eleven, as follows:—

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

Section 1. The state may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the sugregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtus of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed seven haudred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts as contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Section 2. In addition to the above limited power the state may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress morrection, defend the state in war, or to redeen the present unstanding inductable made in war, or to redeen the present unstanding inductable made in war, or to redeen the present unstanding inductable most the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts shall be applied to no other purpose whatever.

Section 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no dobt whatever shall be created by or un behalf of the state.

Section 5. The credit of the commonwealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned to, any individual, company, experation, or association; nor shall the commonwealth hereaftee become a joint owner, or stockholder in any company, association or corporation. Section 6. The commonwealth shall not assume the delt, or any part thereof, of my county, sity, borough, or township; or of any corporation, or association; unless such delt shall have been contracted to e suble the state to repel invasion, suppress dorients insurre tion, defend it seed in time of war, or to assist the state in the dacharge of my portion of its present indebtedness.

Section 7. The legislature shall not ashorize my county, city, horough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens, or otherwises, to become a stockholder in any company, association, or corporation; or to obtain memory (st., or loan its credit to, any corporation, association, institution, or porty.

Any city containing a sufficient cumber of bixables to entitle it to at frast two representatives, shall have a separate representation assigned at, and shall be divided into convenient districts of contiguous territory, of equal table population as over as may be, each of which districts shall elect one representative."

READING, March 4. The undersigned, members of the committee, do respectfully report, that we saw the two Safes originally agreed upon by Farrels & Herring and the line of Evans & Watson, placed side by side in a fur-tace, viz: The Safe inuse by the Paymaster of the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad Company, in his office at Reading, manufactured by Farrels & Herring, and the Safe in use by H. The fire was started at 81 o'clock, A.
