Another Eguption of Mount Vescylus. The London Times of October 10 has a letter

from Nanles, which says:
On Thursday we had one of the finest eruptions of Vesuvius possible to be seen.
Towards seven at night the crater appeared nell on fire, long flames suddenly arose from it then the law gushed forth on a very broad surface, and with very great rapidity, in the direction of the Fosse delle Faraone, and in less than three hours it had run over all the distance that crater from the Atrio del Cavalla, the place where stand the Vesuvian Observatory and the famous hermitage which serves as a refuge for travellers of all countries, for no foreigner comes to Naples with-out making the ascent of Vesuvius. Thanks to the fine mountain road the government has had made, you can ascend it easily in three hours. All the quays of Naples were thronged with people, admiring this beautiful genetics.

BURIED TREASURE COMING TO LIGHT .- The Peninsular (Del.) News says :- The people of the lower part of Sussex, continue to pick up silver coins along the coast. A friend in-forms us that, according to the best informa-tion he can collect, there have been from eight to nine thousand dollars collected altogether. The coin dates as far as 1718, and is in circulation all over Baltimore Hundred .-The prevailing opinion is that it is the money which was buried by Gibbs and Walmsley, the two rotorious pirates, who, after, conviction confessed that they baried money in the sand in that neighborhood."

THE GRAIN CROP OF ILLINOIS.

An estimate of the grain crop of Illinois for the year 1857, which has obtained extensive circulation, fixes the number of bushels at 280,000,000, upon the supposition that the number of acres under cultivation was 10,000,000, and the yield per acre twenty-eight bushels. This estimate, based upon the supposed iscrease in the area of cultivation and the average yield of the land since the statistics of the census of 1850 were published, is pronounced by the Prairie Farmer to be grossly exaggerated. According to the census of 1850, the number of acres under cultivation in that year was 5,035,545, of which not more than 3,500,000 were planted in grain, and the yield was 77,232,184 bushels, or about twenty-two bushels per acre. In order, therefore, to realize the estimate of 280,000,000 of bushels, the area of cultivation must be nearly three times as great as that of 1850, and the ratio of increase per acre more than 25 per cent greater. The following is the estimate of the Prairie Farmer:

the crop of 1850." Artesian Wells in the Desert. The French papers have interesting accounts of newly-bored Artesian Wells in the Sahara Desert in Algiers. They are six in number, and some of them are 275 feet deep. The appearance of the water in each case produced the greatest excitement among the desert tribes. Their joy over the first well was un-bounded, and news of the event spread towards the south with unexampled rapidity.-People came from long distances in order to see the miracle. The Marabouts, with great solemnity consecrated the newly-created well and gave it the name of "the well of peace." At another place as soon as the rejoicing outcries of the soldiers had announced the rushng forth of the water, the natives drew near in crowds plunged themselves into the bles-sed waves and the mothers bathed their children therin. The names immediately applied by the people such as "the well of bliss" and "the well of gratitude," sufficiently attest their feelings.
