## Harmer's Department.

GRUBSIN APPLE TREES.

We have printed in the Weekly Sun, from time to time much information upon the subject of worms in fruit trees as one possessing substantial interest to the farmer who makes fruit one of his crops as we think every farmer should. The following article from the Country Gentleman from an extensive fruit-grower of New York appears to us to contain all the neccessary advice in a nutshell as to the management of apple trees in reference to the borer or grab which in most localities prove so detrimental to the successful culture of the apple. Although September mentioned us the most suitable time to hun the grab-yet we presume it is still in time though requiring a little more care and it is much better to destroy what can be found now than to ailow them to continue the work of destruc-tion undisturbed for another year. But to the article which neght to be proved for ref-After all that has been said about preven-

ting this worm from destroying orchards, yet not one former and tree-planter is benefited. To exterminate them from old trees where they have been allowed to remain undisturbed for years or even in younger trees of eix or ten inches dinmeter would be a work we should not know how to perform successfully. But to save young trees from destruction is easy enough when the work is commenced with the early growth of the tree. The remedy is simple but efficient. Our method is: When the trees have been set in the orchard one year we go to each tree about the first of September and remove the soil from the collar of the tree till we come to the roots then with the back of a knife, or an instrument made for the purpose we scrape the surface of the bark entirely around the tree; and if any insect has begun his work we find it immeately under the bark and next the sap-wood from one-eigth to half an inch in length. The bark is the food for the first year; but if suffered to remain undisturbed another year it is invariably found to have entered the solid wood and often to the centre of the tree where it is safe from all attemps to destroy him except by the actual cutting of the tree till he can be reached by either the knife or a wire prepared for the purpose.

We make this annual examination as regplante as we has one earn and the result is successful, and probably the safest and cheapest method of meeting this destructive insect. In an orchard of more than three thousand trees we believe we have not lost a tree from the grab in three years .- Weckly Sun. 44001

## IMPHEE AGAIN.

Mr. Wray thinks that Implies or the African angar cane will famish the Northern States with means of making angar for themselves. Several varieties of it will ripon perfeetly in from seventy five to one hundred days. He thinks that it can be crystalized by a method which he has used for which he has applied for apatent in the States as well as in Great Britain on I some countries on the coutiment. The method consists of several dis-tinet operations. 1. Treating the leice with "cream of line," without heat. 2. Filtering the juice through charcoal to remove all feculence. This gives a clear bright liquor, without may heat. 3. Heat the liquer to 120 or 180 degrees Farenheit put in nut galls, and bring the liquor to a boiling point. Keep it so a few momels then cool and filter again.— 4. Evaporate the liquor in open pans, skim-ming the seam as it vises till the syrup is ready to grain. 5. Then remove to vessels proper for this purpose. If it should not granulate readily, throw into the concentrated syrup a few ounces of well-grained sugar. This will cause it to grain rapidly. By the use of this method Mr. W. affirms that excellent white angur can always be made from the
