SCALDING MILK .- In Devonshire, England where dairying is extensively practiced, the milk intended for the churn, or for cheese, is scalded as soon as it comes from the cow .-This process is said to obviate most effectually the natural tendency of the milk to sour in warm weather; and when intended for buttermaking, secures the advantage of sweet milk [From the Germansown Telegraph.]

Curing Bacon without Pickle.

PHILIP R. FREAS, Esq. :- In the last issue of your valuable paper, an article from Bucks county, signed "J. D. B.," gives to the public a most valuable method of curing "Bacon without pickle," to which I can add testimony by personal experience although I differ with J. D. B. as to the quantity of saltpetre.

It does seem to me that your correspondent is not definite enough in his article. To be sure he gives the proportions of the ingredients, but does not state what amount of meat it will cure. Now my mode is this; to every hundred

pounds of bacon, take eight pounds of fine salt, eight ounces of brown sugar, and two ounces of sultpetre; pulverise the saltpetre and mix thoroughly with the salt and sugar, and divide the whole into two equal parts.— Take one part and rub your bacon (having t board or platform upon which to lay it) well and put plenty of the compound into the leg with your finger; (we do not score ours;) then sprinkle your board slightly and lay on your meat, taking care not to lay one piece on another, as it does better this way. After nine days elapsed, take the other half of the ingredients and give another rubbing, not forgetting the skin side of the meat. In the course of a week or ten days your meat is sufficiently cured to smoke.

Some people have a delicacy in using saltpetre to any extent upon meat. We like a good quantity, yet think two ounces a plenty for every hundred pounds of bacon, curing back pieces and sides, I believe there is no mode in existence better than the sugar cured pickle that you commended to your readers some time ago. We have often cured sides and back pieces in that way, and found them excellent.

HESS IN WISTER,-If you want the hens to lay eggs during the winter give them chop ped fresh meat and green vegetables such as raw onlons and peppers, boiled potatoes, cabbage etc., water to drink, and a bed of sand gravel to scratch among. 
