The barrow we admit will pull up many wheat plants in the process of harrowing; but theu most of these will be returned by the pressure of the roller. The roller will not only return the greatest por-tion of the roots to the earth that may be pulled up by the harrow, but will also bury many of the joints of the plants, the most of which will take root and grow into wheatbearing plants, and thes, by encouraging tillering, will more than compensate for any plants killed by the operation of harrowing. We believe that for every plant pulled up by the harrow, the roller, by the borying of the joints, will cause two other plants to tiller and grow. This is not all. When the water is hot and the soap nearly dissolved put in the sal soda and borax. Stir it gently until all is dissolved; then pour it into a tub. and when nearly cool stir in the ammonia gradually. Let it remain until quite cold, when it can be cut into bars and laid away like common hard soap. 
