EXPLOSION OF THE STARMSOAT PENN-SYLVANIA.

Particulars of the Disaster-Near Two Handred Lives Lost-Most Horrible Disaster of the Western Waters.

From the Memphis Eagle, 16th inst :-- We have to record at the present time, probably, the most borrible steamboat accident and love of life that ever occurred upon the Mississippi. The fine steamer Pennsylvania, commanded by Capt. Klinfelter, and plying be tween the cities of St. Louis and New Orrdeaw Island, lying about seventy mile below this city, Sunday morning last, between the hours of six and seven, exploded two of her boders-making a report as of a hundred pleases of ordinance, and blowing the entire cont portion of the boat, together with about two hundred of her passengers -- both deck and cabin -- hundreds of feet into the air --Many of them were asleep in their borths at the time, and were hurried, unawakened, into eternity. The steamer Diana, which also came to the place of accident, did her part nobly. She took ten of the wounded from the Prisboe and brought them to the wharf boat here. Some she took on up the river.

The exact cause of this heart-rending accideat cannot be ascertained. They only had on between 130 and 135 pounds of steam. J. while her charter permits 140. They were not firing up at the moment, but on the contrary, were cleaning the coals out of the darances. Her machinery was some seven years old—which most likely, was the cause of her bursting.
