"See what I do with this diploma," said Webster to the college boys. "I tear it into pieces." And then he uttered the text of which his whole life was the sermon-"M industry may make me a great man, but this miserable parchinent cannot.

Daniel Webster we consider to have been one of the collossi among all men living in this generation. He had a great and sound mind in a great and sound body. Some men. only show one phase of humanity, and that is, in many instances, the effeminate part of it.
