## Farmers' Department.

THE BEST BREED OF HOOS .- A farmer who communicates his views through a New England journal, after going over all the choice breed of hogs—the Berkshire, the Leicester, the Suffolk, and White Chester, says, the "White Chester are a large, deep sided, small boned breed-will weigh from 400 to 500 pounds at 12 months old, when properly fattened. I think them the most profitable swine for farmers. Of grades, there is the Leicester crossed with the Suffeck or Berkshire boar; the progeny will be finer in the bone and mature earlier than the Leicester, and will weigh heavier and produce more side pork than the Berkshire. For a pure breed, consider the White Chester superior to all others; they combine, in a great degree, the large pork producing qualities of the Leicester, with the fineness of bone and carly maturing of the Suffolk and others."

CORN CORS .- Many farmers are somewhat sceptical in regard to the value of this product of the corn plant. Science, however, has abundantly demonstrated the fact, that the quantity of alimentary matter contained in them is considerable. Experiments have been made which seem satisfactorily to prove that bread made from the fine flour obtained from the pith of cobs, is not only quite nutri-tive, but salutary to health. That the cob is possessed of too much value to be regarded us mere rubbish, is too obvious to be doubted, even for a moment. A series of very simple experiments might be easily instituted for the purpose of accurately determining this point, the nature of which will readily occur to every mind. To MARE COOPED HENS LAY -- It is pretty well known that hens will not lay, except occasionally, when "cooped up." It should be extensively known that a small daily allowance of raw meat of any kind will restore not only the power to the hen, but the necessity to lay every day, supposing, of course, that the other portion of the food is of the ordinary kind. No fowl lives exclusively on a vegetable diet, and when rouning at large. domestic fowls will be found searching for and boys (cheap.) insects with great avidity. Those of your farmer renders who are not aware of this fact, may obtain a better supply of eggs by following this advice. So says a correspondent of the Scientific American.

WHEN TO PRUNE APPLE TREES .- A farmer in the Chester County Times says :-"Many farmers have, I think, a wrong idea as to the time of pruning their apple trees, say ing it is of consequence when the tree is pruned if it only needs pruning. This, I am ready
to say, is a said mistake; for all seasons when
the sap is down it is entirely wrong The
first or second week in June is the only fit
season for prunning the apple tree. Then
the sap is in full flow, and the wound made by
cutting off a bough begins to heal and grow
over immediately." [We agree in this view
and the system can be applied to pears as
well as apples. We pursue it in relation to

Our house ceilings, and the walls, were not papered, which received one coat lust May, are now as white as after a usual fresh coat o of lime, and we have not been troubled in the least with its "rubbing off." The numerous published receipts to the contrary notwithstanding, we believe no preparation of lime or other material will adhere well without the soil is productive and contains limestone and addition of glue, oil or varnish. The latter other minerals. two articles are expensive, and caustic lime mixed with glue will soon change its color. White chalk is uncaustic lime, (carbnuate of time,) and this substance is the best substi-time, and this substance is the best substi-tute for lime as a white wash. A very fine small orchard of choice fruit. and brilliant white wash preparation of chalk is called "Paris White."

This we buy at the paint stores for 3 cents per pound, retail. For each sixteen pounds of Paris White, we procure half a pound of the white transparent glue, costing twentylive cents. The sixteen pounds of Paris White is about as much as a person will use in a day. It is prepared as follows :

The glue is covered with cold water at night, and in the morning is carefully heated, without scorching, until dissolved. The Paris White is stirred with hot water enough to give it the proper milky consistence for applying to the walls, and the dissolved glue is the added and thoroughy mixed. It is then applied with a brush like the common lime whitewash. Except on very dark and smoky walls and cellings, a single coat is sufficient It is nearly equal in brilliancy, to "zinc white," a far more expensive article. Let the readers of the American Agricultural, try this method the present Spring on a room or two at least, and we think they will not use lime thereafter. It is, of course, a little more expensive than common lime, but is cheaper in the end, on account of its better color, greater permanence, and firm adherance to the plantering. At least, such is our experience - American

Agriculturist. How to Raise Easily Tonators - About the first of April, take a few large turnips and cut out the hearts of them, to form a sort of cup. Fill the cavities with earth, and plant two or three tomato seeds in each .-When the seeds have well sprouted, pull up all but, the healthiest plant in each turnip, and let those that remain stand where they will have the benefit of the sun ; the plant will grow very thrifty-the decaying turnip furnishing it food. When the weather be comes sufficiently warm, set the turnips in well prepared soil, not less than three feet spart, make lath frames to keep the vines from the ground, and keep the soil well billed up around them, and you will have a crop bat will estonish the natives
