FRANCE-THE AMERICAN BONAPARTES. The Paris correspondent of the London Morning Star writes as follows :

A family council, presided over by the Emperor, and comprising Prince Jerome, Prince Napoleon, the Princess Mathilde, and two of the Cabinet Ministers, is said to have been held at the Palais recently, to hold a conference concerning the proper steps to be adopted in the affair of Jerome Patterson, which is beginning to give great annoyance to the Imperial family. The publication of the par-ticulars of the first marriage of Prince Jerome Bonaparte-at that time merely Lieutenant Bonaparte, in the service of the French Republic-with Miss Patterson, an American citizen, as detailed in the last volume of "Thiers' History of the Consulate and Em pire," has roused the ingenuity as well as the sense of justice in the bosom of Jerome Patterson; and, upon reading the account, as given by Thiers, he immediately sent his protestation, with a copy of the letter writ-ten by Pius VII on the occasion of the secend marriage, wherin his Holiness refuses to annul the first, there existing, according to the Romish law, no reason whatever for so doing. The Emperor Napoleon then, taking claimed by every royal and imperial house in Europe, of sanctioning or annulling a mar-riage contracted by any of its members by the will declared, in spite of the Pope, that the marriage was void, and that his brother Jerome must forthwith marry the Princess

Charlotte of Wurtemburg.

Now, Jerome, who had been quietly enjoying a country life with the wisdom and dignity of a man little caring for the greatness which he beholds as the affliction of his family, is suddenly awakened to the idea that it the second-not the first-marriage which is illegal. It was Madame Bonaparte's con-sent which had been considered necessary in order to legalize the first marriage. She had been consulted on that occasion, as she was, according to French law, by the death of her husband, the head of the family. This was therefore, the act by which the Patterson marriage was dissolved, without consent of the widowed head of the Imperial family. As a civil formality, and in actual defiance of the l'ope's decree as a religious necessity, it must naturally be regarded as contrary to the jurisprudence of the country, and conse-quently of no effect—null and void—he who contracted it unconsciously guilty of bigamy, and the issue of such marriage to stand se-

heirs of the contractor. Jerome Patterson's defence of his conduct is most independent and noble. "For myself I seek nothing. I am as proud of my glorious title of an American citizen as I should be of that of Prince Imperial of France. During Prince Jerome's lifetime no measure shall be adopted to restore those who are dependent on my love to their rightful position, protestation is necessary for their security in

future years." It has been decided that the volume must appear with the letter and protest—another protest to come before the public, by way of answer, immediately afterwards. The affair is looked upon as a great annoyance, nothing more; but it is that; and were it not for the calmness with which the Emperor bimself guides his family affairs, much barm minht. be occasioned by it. The strictest secresy is meanwhile commanded to the journals, to all of which it has been intimated en masse that it would be considered an offence a la suppression to speak of it for the present. Meanwhile Thiers rubs his little hands, and rejoices that the world will say-Who would have thought the old man had so much mischief

in him yet? WILL THE COAL FIELDS HOLD OUT! Science some sixty years ago, started the in- 67 quiry "will the coal Fields hold out ?" and gave an unpropitious and alarming answer to An abstract of the report of Professor Rogers on the coal trade of America and Great Britain shows, the enormous amount now annually consumed, and the ratio in which that consumption has increased within the last third of a century. The produce of the American fields during the year 1859, has been computed at 9,000,000 of tons. The produce of Great Britian during the same year was 68,000,000. The entire produce of the coal fields of the world is estimated for the same time at 100,000,000. These figures are startling enough. But when we recollect the rapidity with which they have been reached from comparatively small amounts, the vista they disclose is incomparably more so. The British coal trade has heretofore doubled itself in about twenty-four years. This, however, is a slow rate of advance compared with that which has been made in our own trade. We take the produce of the anthracite mines of Pennsylvania as it is exhibited in the tables of Professor Rogers, as an example. In thirty-eight years from 1820 to 1858, it advanced at the rate of 184,000 tons per annum, and 1839 to 1849, the produce doubled itself in each five years, while it has again doubled itself in eight years. We have seen that the American coal trade began in 1820, with 350 tons, and had reached in 1859, 9,000,000! And then with the increase of wealth and the consequent increase of wants, with the constantly multiplying applications and uses of coal in the arts, with the opening of new mines of the various metals, all of which must be worked by the abundant consumption of coal; with the rapid exhaustion of what remains of the forests; with the progressive exploration and civilization of noncoal-producing countries, and the growing demand for closer connection and more fre quent intercourse between remote nations, it is difficult to predict or conceive the extent which the use of mineral fuel may reach in the next twenty-five years. In the great Northern, or Newcastle field in England, there are about 57 different seams of coal. These vary in thickness from 1 inch to 6 feet, and they form an aggregate of about 76 feet of coal.
