GOV. WALKER AND THE PRESIDENT, Official Statement of the Affair-Another

Letter From Ex-Gov. Walker. WASHINGTON, Eriday, April 20, 1860. To the Editors of the National Intelligencer GENTLEMEN: A very Inaccurate statement of my testimony before the Covode Investi-gating Committee of Congress has been pub-

lished in the New-York papers.

Much and long as we may have differed on political questions, I have faith that you will

be willing to do me justice by a truthful publication of the facts of the case.

I send you a correct statement of my evidence before the Committee; also a copy of my letter of 28th June, 1857, to Mr. Buchanan, and to which bis of July 12th was a reply. Accompanying this is my statement to the Committee as regards this letter, to produce

which I reserved my right.

I submit the whole to an impartial public with this comment only: That the correspondence proves that Mr. Buchanan and myself concurred in the Spring of 1857 in the con-struction of the Kansas and Nebraska act, that it required the submission of the Constitution to the vote of the people of Kansas To that construction of that act, which Mr. Buchanan and myself were both sworn to support, I adhered; and therefore considered the refusal of the Convention to submit the Constitution to the vote of the people as a clear violation of the Kansas and Nebraska clear violation of the Range and therefore, under its distinct provi-sions, null and void, I was sworn to support that law, and so was Mr. Buchapan. did support it, and therefore opposed the withholding of the Constitution from the vote of the people. It is quite clear, as was the opinion of Mr. Buchanan and myself, that the Kansas and Nebraska act required the sub-mission of the Constitution to the vote of the p ople; and any action in Kansas repugnant to that act was, under its provisions null and void. So I regarded such action, and therefore it was my duty to oppose it.

But there were other reasons. The programme finally adopted did not, as pretended submit even the Slavery question to the vote of the people; nay, it deliberately, and willfully, and fraudulently withheld that question from their vote. The only question sulfinitted was, "For the Constitution with Slavery" "For the Constitution without Slavery; thus excluding by a deliberate fraud from this vote all, constituting an overwhelming majority, who were opposed to the Constitution. And this was the very reason given to me by Calhoun, the President of the Convention, why this peculiar language was selected. It was a wretched device of fraud and villainy.

I send you a copy, preserved in the bandwriting of my Secretary, of my letter of the 28th June, 1857, to which Mr. Buchanan's was a reply. That letter, disclosing my in-most thoughts, and never intended to meet the public eye, will show how false has been the statement that my action in Kansas was hostile to the South. It was all in their favor, to the extent of the just and honest exercise of my power in Kansas. I believed, and so announced then my anxious desire, to the execution of which my life has been devoted, to preserve the equilibrium of the Gov-ernment. I indorsed fully the Dred Scott decision, and especially that portion of it (always maintained by me) that the true period when the people can abolish Slavery in a Territory is when they perform the first act of sovereignty in ferming a State Consti-tation. I maintained this doctrine in an elaborate argument published over my signa-ture in June, 1856, from which I have never departed.

THE PRESIDENT'S ORGAN ON GOV. WAL-KER'S TESTIMONY.

From the Constitution of Saturday. For the present, we pass without comment the testiorony of Hon. R. J. Walker, which has been so conspicuously heralded to the world. Instead of answers to any interregatory, it seems to be a carefully-prepared account of his stewardship as Governor of

He says the President favored the submission of the Constitution of Kansas to the people, and so he did. That is fully admitted, this has never been denied. But he says further, that during the progress of the Lecompton Convention he was advised by Mr. Calhoun, the President, that the plan finally adepted, which Mr. Walker, considers great departure from the doctrine of submission, was suggested and approved by the President. The statement of Mr. Calhoun he did not believe. He acquits the President of all knowledge of the programme adopted, and then he uses this exact language ;

-it is assodue to frankness to further say that I am fully impressed with the conviction that the President himself did not get up this programms, though I do believe it was by some of the Administration, or others high in authority."

At this time the propriety or impropriety of the plan is not a question with which we care to deal. Who got it up, or whether it was in accordance with Mr. Walker's or the President's plan is not put in issue. But when Mr. Walker says "it was gotten up by some of the Administration," he must mean all the world will understand him to mean, the market can produce by some member of the Cabinet. Here arises a grave question. If any member of the Cabinet has sought, or has taken steps, to change the line of action of the President in an important matter of State policy, without the advice, knowledge, or consent of the President, he has been guilty of an act. The World's Great Exhibition Prize of infidelity and bad faith which should invoke his severest censure. Indeed such conduct would be dishonorable, and justly incur a forfeiture of his confidence.

In this view we think we have the right to demand of Mr. Walker the naming of the individual implicated. In the absence of a reply, we shall maintain he is wholly mistaken, or is wholly unable to substantiate the grounds of his belief.

Washington, April 23 .- Attorney General Black intends prosecuting Mr. Schnabel on the charge of perjury, growing out of the tes-timony before the Covode Committee. His most intimate friends say that he distinctly admitted the existence of the President's letter, as recently published, but denied the existence of one of the character the witness described in the course of conversation, and which Mr. Walker never even pretended to have in his possession. It is further stated that Mr. Black, acting by the advice of his friends, has made no reply to Mr. Walker; but, in a note addressed to Mr. Walker's friend, Senator Brown, and on Saturday de livered by Secretary Thompson, he denied the existence of any reason why Governor Walker should request him to go out of the District to receive a hostile message, even if he were not conscientiously opposed to that
