SENATOR DOUGLAS ON JULEPS. In the speech at Petersburg, Va., Tuesday night, Judge Douglas, gave the following historical account of the "discovery" of

About the year 1776, a man, by the name of George Rogers Clarke, applied to the Governor of Virginia, and suggested to him that as peace might at any time be declar-ed between Great Britian and the colonies, it would be well for us to be in possession of the Northwest territory—that which is now Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, and Wisconsin-se that when the commissioners came to negotiate the treaty of peace, we might act on the well-known principle of uti possession. He suggested to the Governor, that he should permit him to go out to the Northwest, conquer the country, and hold it until the treaty of peace, when we would become possessed of it. The Governor consented, and sent him across the mountains to Pittsburg. From there he and his company floated down the Obio river on rafts to the falls where Louisville now is, and after remaining there a short time, they again took to their rafts, and floated down to the Salines, just below Shawneetown, in Illinois. Here they took up their march across the country to Kaskaskia, where there were a number of French who had formed a settle. ment there, and by means of a guide they reached the Oquaw river, and encamped near l'eter Merend's bouse, some little distance from the town. You see I am well acquainted with the locality. [Laughter and applause.] They reached there at night, and early the next morning Clarke, got his little army of ragamuffins together, (for they had no army wagons with supplies, no sutler, and no stores, and by this time began to look ragged and wretched enough,) and took up his line of march for the little French sitting quietly on the little verendahs in front of their houses, sucking their juleps through a straw, and he rushed on them, crying, "Surrender you suckers, you!"[Great laughter] The Frenchmen surren-dered, and from that day to this Illinoisans have been known as "Suckers." [Renewed Laughter.

That was the origin of our cognomen, and when George Rogers Clarke returned to Virginia, he introduced the juleps here .-[Laughter.] Now, I want to give Virginians fair notice that, when they claim the honor of a Jefferson, of a Madison, of a Marshall, of a Wythe, of a George Mason, and of many other distinguished sages and patriots as the world ever saw, we yield ; when you claim the glory you achieved on the field of battle, we yield; when you claim credit for the cession of the Northwest Territory, that out of it sovereign States might be created, we yield ; when you claim the glory of never having polled a vote against the Democratic party, we yield; but when you claim the glory of the mint julep. hands off; Illinois wants that, [Shouts of

isughter and applause.]
The above extract, showing not only the remarkable geographical knowledge of Judge Douglas, but his versatility in the illustrations of his great doctrine, is erroneous in a single particular, and that is that Illinois is entitled to the glory of the discovery how to construct a julep. That great Democrat John Milton, some two hundred years ago, in his magnificent poem of Conns, speaks of the julep in the following glowing terms: "And first behold this cordial jolep here,

That flames and dances in his crystal bounds, With spirits of balm and fragrant syrups mix'd Not that nepenthe which the wife of Thone, In Egypt, gave to Jove-born Helena, Is of such power to stir up joy as this, To life so friendly, or so cool to thirst."

ANOTHER OF THE WORLD'S HEROES The Detroit Free Press, of the 11th instant, commenting on the Lady Elgin disasters eays: "We have glimpses of a terrible panic among the passengers, in the midst of which verywhere appears the self possessed com mander, giving orders and overseening such measures as were most conductive to the general safety. The cattle were driven over board, and the freight and luggage immediately followed. Passengers were awakened from their slumbers by sturdy blows of the axe, which dashed in their stateroom doors, and called them to a sense of their danger. All were finally collected on deck, which constitutes the roof of the upper cabin floated clear of the bull and sustained the crowd. Mr. Bellman says that on his extempore raft not less than three hundred persons were collected, the unjority of whome cloug to their places until near doylight. The raft was mostly under water from the weight of its living burden, and very lew who clang to it but were above the waist in the turbulent sea. The captain was constantly on his feet encouraging the crowd, and seems to have been the only man who dared to stir from the recumbent position which was necessary to keep a secure bold on the precarious raft, He carried a child, which he found in the arms of an exhausted and submerged woman to an elevated portion of the raft, and left in charge of a woman which was soon lost. He constantly exhorted the crowd to keep silent, and not only to make no noise but to refrain from moving, in order that the frail frame work might last the longer. Bellman says that during the time which elapsed, while the while the raft kept together, there was scarcely a sound from a man, or woman or child. They clong to their places in silent terror, and neither groans nor prayers were audible tio voice save that of the captain, raised aloud in encouragement and good cheer, being heard amid the roar of the wind and the ceaseless splash of the combing waves. Finally, the constant action of the water broke up the raft, and large parties floated off on detached pieces, and gradually the multitude melted away by couples and solitary individuals, until but a tithe of the whole number remained. The swell tumbled the light rafts about like feather weights, and a weary struggle the hapiess survivors had during the long drift of ten miles intervening to the shore. Bellman was ten hours on his raft and says that he was capsized and throws into the sea, with his two companions, every third minute. When they reached shore, they were dashed about hopelessly in the surf, and more fortunate than their companions, were lifted upon the beach by the breakers, and dragged ashore by strong hands which awaited them. It was here that having surmounted the perils of that terribly voyage, the commander succumbed and gave way to the irresistible force which had worn out his strength and Perhaps he had rather died than to have lived in the exercise of more selfish motives than those which marked his charac-

ter through the whole of this trying ordeal. PASSENGER BAILWAYISM IN ENGLAND.
