#### FROM GENERAL HALLECK'S ARTIN.

A UNION SENTIMENT AT MEMPHIS.

CAIRO, April 28. The steamer Estella has arrived here from Pittsburg Landing.

There is no news from the bombardment of Fort Wright. The mortars still fire occasionally

Refugees from Memphis report that a strong Union feeling exists there, and a majority of the people were anxiously awaiting the arrival of our forces to take possession of the city.

It was not believed that the town would be burned; but all the cotton, sugar and molasses will be destroyed.

Generals Van Dorn, Price and Thompson were at Memphis with about 6000 miserably clad troops. They remain there to awe the people into submission to the conscription act which is being enforced. Hundreds of the inhabitants were leaving daily to avoid impressment.

The twelve months' men, whose term of service is about to expire, refuse to re-enlist under any circumstances, and are deserting in large numbers.

CARRO, April 28.—(Special to the Chicago Times.)—Advices from Pittsburg Landing to Sunday night have been received.

The roads were improving, and the preparations for the coming battle are progressing steadily.

The pickets of the two armies are now only two and and a half miles apart.

There is much sickness among our troops. the result of fatigue, exposure and the un healthy climate.

Refugees report that Gen. Villipique is still in command of Fort Wright, and has a force of from 6000 to 8000 men. The guns from Fort Randolph have been taken there and large numbers of negroes are constantly at work strengthening the fortifications.


There is a report here, which is deemed reliable, that the Rebel gun-boat fleet was coming up the river to attack our fleet for the possession of the Mississippi.

On the reception of this report, a steame was immediately despatched to Island No. 10, having on board gunners sufficient to man the batteries there.

The refugees report that a despotic censor ship is excreised in all parts of the South. The public prints dare to utter nothing derogatory to the cause of the Rebellion. They also say that Union men there are as firm and loyal as ever, rejoicing at the near approach

of the Union army, Union clubs meet in Memphis, and are holding correspondence with similar clubs in nearly every large city in the South.

General Prentiss and the other Union prisoners were received with marked attention by the Union people. They were taken
