THE NATIONAL CONSCRIPTION BILL passed the House of Representatives on Wednesday last week, nearly as it came from the Senate, by 65 majority, the vote being 113 to 49 nays. All the Republicans voted for it but one, and all the Democrats voted against it but three.

We see that a general bill has passed the Senate at Harrisburg, and no doubt will pass the House, legalizing the payment of bounties last summer by counties and other corporations for the purpose of stimulating volunteering. The bill renders perfectly valid, all payments made and contracts or agreements entered into by County Commissioners or other officers on account of such volunteer bounty fund. This will legalize the appropriation made by our County Commissioners.

Local Affairs.

A newly born female, child with a congenital defect, was found in the river about a mile above Georgetown, this county, on Monday last. An inquest was held by Dr. Strickler, Esq., who rendered a verdict that the child had been strangled and then thrown into the river, by some person unknown to them.

RELIGIOUS REVIVAL.—The revival meetings which commenced in the Lutheran Church in this place two weeks ago, continued in successful progress. THE CANALS.—We understand that it is the intention of the various canal companies throughout the State, to have the lines in operation as early as possible, in anticipation of an immense trade. We may therefore look for an early opening of trade and commerce" on the canals of the State.

Committee appointed at last meeting of Council to revise and amend Supplement to Charter, reported that they had attended to their studies, and on motion, report was received and discharged.

The following bills were presented and ordered granted for the same:

Jno. W. Bruffing, salary for clerking last year, \$25.00
S. F. Boyce, salary as Asst. Chief Burgess, \$25.00
S. F. Boyce, in view of getting amendment to supplement to Charter, passed by the Legislature, \$25.00

B. Brown, bill approved and order granted.

On motion that we proceed to an election of Budget Treasurer, Jas. W. Bruffing was nominated and unanimously elected.

On motion, adjourned. J. W. Bruffing, Clerk.

The skirmish of fire was heard in our streets at about 12 o'clock, on Saturday night last—the first for a long time, which gave great alarm, more particularly an account of the very high wind at the time. LETTER FROM THE SUNBURY GUARDS.
REVERE, MASS.—Feb. 1, 1863.

DEAR FRIENDS.—Yesterday a week ago, the 20th N. Y. Vol. Col. Morgan, arrived at Key West to relieve our regiment. We were not all surprised at being relieved, had expected it, and were all exceedingly glad that we were to make our exit from the service. We were to be sent to the front, who are at—dagger points with the citizens who should be sent back to see to the welfare of Indians. Considering the colored people, took all slaves, and caused much trouble in the country, the 4th Regt. of the 20th N.Y. Vol. Col. Morgan, arrived at Key West, but owing to high winds, and very probably, the superstitions idea of Friday being an unlucky day causing the sailors to not leave the ship until next morning, we were not able to get away until Saturday morning, and slowly and quietly down the harbor, passed the good war ship U.S. Frigate and Fort Taylor, and saw no hour had passed, Key West was but to our vision, so can I say with the rest of the regt., "I hope the

Col. Morgan's return was a great thing for the colored population of Key West. He is looked upon as the greatest man of the age, always exacting justice, and they may soon be suppressed by him. To these we arrived exceeding anything I have yet seen. One old fellow, Sandy, I thought would go out of his mind, as the time he would have been a good engineer for several tugs & tugs to get him to Key West, and a long time the last and least of

dark hue had of it. In the morning the male portion had a procession, with music (urnished by themselves and banners flying; conspicuous were the Stars and Stripes). By the way, a Colonel, that is present of Key West, is here, and P. who was an expert was testing and fanning from Charleston to Nassau during the Revolutionary war, threw a stone at the procession as it was passing by, and came very near hitting the Colonel, who, however, a tall, dark, lank, scraggly, balding, hairy, half-wit son of Lehigh county, asked the fellow if he had thrown that stone to insult the flag, when he received an answer, something like "my own business," for which he received a stone from the sheriff, and the sheriff, who was a good, honest, frank fellow, he had to be carried by his friends, teaching him a lesson not to meddle with the emblem of Liberty when the 4th boys are about. In the afternoon the party had a gay and happy time at the "Bassoon," a large hall, where the men were dancing. Four large tables were set, and to say they "grounded" under the weight of good things, substantial and dainty, would be an understatement. The truth is, the tables were covered with great quantities, but every one had his fill, of which, more than one officer and many soldiers can bear witness to. Your humble servant did not partake, being merely a looker on. Mr. Curtis, a rich speculator addressed them in a speech, and told them to remember the President, in his wisdom, had made them so, and hoped they would keep as good a character for honesty and truth as they had when they were in bondage. Said the antislavery faction of the day. The days festivities concluded with music and dancing—the latter accomplishment being done up in the "square dance" of that day, and the former, singing the "Negro Melody."
