The Destruction of the Warrenton Batteries.

WASHINGTON May 20. Acting Rear Admiral Porter, in a des-patch to the Navy Department, from the Yazoo river, under date of the 15th inst.

"A few days since the Mound City, Lieut, Commanding Bryon Wilson, came up as far as Warrenton to reconnoitre and see what guns were there likely to annoy our transports. The rebels have been engaged for some months in building a strong casemated water battery, intending to mount eight teninch guns on it. This work was built with cotton bales covered with logs; the logs covered with railroad iron, and the whole covered with earth.

On approaching the fort Lieut, Com'g Wilson sent a party on shore to reconnoitre. On climbing up the casemate to look in, the party discovered that a company of artifletista had taken refure there. Supposing themselves perfectly secure, our men fired their revolvers into the crowd, and warned the vessel that the rebels were about. Com'g Wilson then commenced shelling the fort, and in a short time all was in a blaze. After burning thoroughly for some time, the whole work was descroyed. Thus ended a fort in the space of an hour, which had taken the rebels five months to build, work.

Its thickness can be tried by putting a little be on either hand of such a oughfare, these hundred wires, for such a distance as they can be conveniently made to run together, are enclosed in one cable fire. Have a tub ready soaked to prevent to run together, are encounted from each other by the soap from sticking, pour it in and let it set till solid, when you will have from the above quantity of ingredients, about forty pounds of nice white soap, at a cort of about two cents per pound. A WHOLESOME DRINK, -The excessive use of cold water during the sweltering heat of summer, often results in serious and alarming illness. It is therefore advisable that some beverage should be substituted for it, of which those oppressed with thirst, can partake with safety. For this purpose I am aware of no better or more refreshing drink than the following: Take of the best white Jamaica ginger root, carefully bruised, two ounces; cream of tartar, one ounce; water six quarts, to be boiled tor about five minutes, then strained; to the strained liquor add one pound of the best white sugar, and again place it over the fire; keep it well stirred till the sugar is perfectly dissolved, and then pour it into an earthen vessel, into mixture of impostectly aggravated quarts any one of them, as at every two hundred and let it remain till the heat is reduced to a new profess have take the vellow sulphured a connecting box or plate pierced with small a lukewarm temperature; then add a table-holes, through which every separate wire, and bottle for use. The corks must be well in discovering instantly a fault that occur in any one of them, as at every two hundred of tartaric acid, and the rind of a lemon, going or retarning, spreads out from the cable, and, having thus passed, is bound secured. The drink will be in high perfection in four or five days. This is a very refreshing and wholesome beverage, and one which may be largely partaken of without any unpleasant result even in the hottest weather.
