As it was supposed that the chief object of this request on the part of the Yankee commander was to gain an opportunity to reconnoitre our position the proposition was declined, and the duty of burying the dead devolved upon our own men, and on Sunday no firing occurred. MOVEMENTS OF GEN ROSECTINS. FORTRESS MONROE, Monday, July 27 .-The Richmond Enquirer of the 24th, has the following: "ATLANTA Thursday, July 27.

Gen. Rosecrans is organizing a force to attack Atlanta and make a raid on the Northwestern Georgia Railroad, Active preparations are being made for the defence of the city and railroad to Chattanooga."

.... The venerable statesman and patriot, Daniel S. Dickinson, of New York, has made an eloquent and patriotic speech in reference to the recent riots in New York. This is the way in which he spoke of Goy, Seymour and the enemies of the conscription :

"He warned the merchants, farmers and mechanics that this spirit of rebellion, which politicians are seeking to handle with furred mittens, will take their goods, their produce and their wares, and compel them to pay for their support, unless they put it down at once. He should do himself and the cause injustice if he did not say that he felt his State to be disgraced when high officers of the State from the Chief Executive to a high judicial functionary, to a mob in mild and deprecatory language, instead of putting them down with a strong hand. The only speeches he need make to such men would be made with shot and shell, and the only messages he would send would be from the mouths of cannon. [Applause]. When he saw public officers tampering with mobs and addressing them, he thought there must be

something wrong." A GOOD DODGE TO ESCAPE THE DRAFT .--One of the amiable and excellent Quartermasters belouging to army, and whose residence is in our present neighborhood, at Millerstown, relates the following incident,
