

A Joint Resolution proposing certain Amendments to the Constitution.

DE IT DESOLVED BY THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE COM-TONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA IN GENERAL Assembly MET, That the following amendents be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the

provisions of the tenth article thereof : There shall be an additional section to the third article of the Constitution, to be des' gnated as section four, as follows : SECTION 4. Whenever any of the quali-

ed electors of this Commonwealth shall be n any actual military service, under a requi-ition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right f suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are, or shall be prescribed by law, as fully as if they were

resent at their usual place of election. There shall be two additional sections to the eleventh article of the Constitution, to e designated as sections eight, and nine, as allows :

SECTION S. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature, containing more than one sub-ject, which shall be clearly expressed in the itle, except appropriation bills. 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legisla-
