third article of the Constitution, to be designated as section four, as follows:

"SECTION 4. Whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in actual military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States. or by the authority of this Commonwealth, such electors may exercise the right of suffrage in all elections by the citizens, under such regulations as are, or shall be prescribed by law, as fully as if they were present at

SECTION 2. There shall be two additional sections to the eleventh article of the Constitution, to be designated as eight, and nine, as follows: "Section 8. No bill shall be passed by

the Legislature, containing more than one subject, which shall be clearly expressed in the title, except appropriation bills."
"Section 9. No bill shall be passed by the Legislature granting any powers, or privileges, in any case, where the authority to grant such powers, or privileges, has been, or may hereafter be, conferred upon the
