General Averill's Late Victory.

HARPER'S EERRY, Aug. 9. General Averill attacked the combined forces of M'Causland, Johnson, Gilmore and M'Neil, on the morning of the 7th, and after a spirited fight, completely routed their artillery-four pieces, a vast quantity of small arms, 400 horses and equipments, and 420 prisoners, including 6 field officers and 32 company officers. M'Cansland, with his broken demoralized command, has fled to the mountains. Our loss was comparatively small 7 killed and 21 wounded. our killed are Major Congress and 1st Lieut Clark, of 3rd Virginia cavalry. They were struck down while gallantly leading a charge. Capt. Keer was severely wounded while penetrating the enemy's lines,
