

Notes for the Garden.

Preparation for winter is all that can now be done here. Let roots of different sorts be taken up at once, and stored where they can be most conveniently got for use. Paranips and falsily, or syster plant, are better left in the ground until towards spring.— Bury cabbages in trenches up to their leaves, and protect with the best covering you can command, put upon forks just high enough to admit the circulation of air. FRUIT GARDEN.—Hardy fruits may all be now planted, if the soil be dry. The ground bould be at once put in a thorough state of preparation by plowing and manuring. If thus put in good condition, little manure is wanted immediately about the roots of the tree. It is not well that young trees da forced into too rapid development. Avaid deep holes in planting. The tree should, at arthest, be put no deeper than it stood in the nursery. Peaches, apricots and necta-rines are better planted in spring; apples, pears, quinces, plants, cherries and walnuts, may be planted now. Plant also raspberries currants and goodeberries now.

Grape vines may be planted now, or they
