COURT AND BASTARD ACT.—On evening last, a large Union Mass Meeting at Danville. An omnibus train was run from Danville and Lackawanna railroad and number of the citizens of this place and others went to hear the great orator, George Pennock, for rejecting the vote of Northumberland, for rejecting the vote of George Pennock. As the objections were made by Mr. P. it became my duty to vindicate these gentlemen, especially as a majority of them differ with me politically.

Mr. FREDERICK.—An attorney having been appointed to represent the interests of the Commonwealth, he has given another proof of his skillful honesty, even when his strongest prejudices were assailed.

In the letter of attorney he solemnly declares that no other person had been authorized to do so. It was offered by Charles E. Little, who had no more right to it, than you or I.

In the second place, no soldier has a right to vote by proxy, unless he is at a post, where there are less than ten qualified voters of Pennsylvania. This fact did not appear, even in his statement.

In the third place, George Denham was less than twenty-one years old. He was born April 13, 1844, and consequently will not be of age until April 12, 1865. I have seen the record of his birth in the family bible, and his mother says the record is right. Besides there are respectable citizens in Northumberland, who remember the date of his birth.

It is not customary in Northumberland for either party to permit an illegal vote to be polled against them, if they can help it.

As the party to which I am opposed, have always had the control, it sometimes gives them a little the advantage in this respect, but not when Mr. Hengler is Judge.

I trust this brief statement will convince your readers, that our Democratic election board did no wrong in rejecting this three-fold illegal vote.
