TRIAL FOR MORDER .- The trial of Edward Rhodes, for the murder of Mrs. Chamberlin, on the 24th of September, in Shanokin township, was commerced on Monday morning, and occupied nearly the entire week. The testimony was only closed, as we were going to Press, on Priday. The offentestances in releasing to the murder, have al-ready been published, and are simply these. Mr. Chemberlin had been at Sunbury that day. On his return, in the evening, he found the house closed, and neither his wife, whom he had left in possession. nor any one else was to be seen. On entering the bouse he found his powder-horn hanging on the chair, and his gun taken down. Up stairs he found that a leather trunk, in which he had about \$200 in money had been broken open, and the money gone. On further search the body of Mrs. Chamberlin was found in the woods, several hundred yards from the house. A discharged gun was lying close by her. On examination, it was found that she had been shot through the head, a number of shot hav-

ing been extracted. Edward B. Rhodes, the accused, is a man about 25 years of age, and is married to a daughter of Mr. Chamberlin, by his first wife. According to some of the testimony, Rhodes had a grudge against the deceased, having declared, some months previous, that he would kill her. The testimony relied on to convict him, is all circumstantial. The prisoner has been employed at the Lancaster Colliery for some years.
