

More About the Late Failure. WASHINGTON, Jan. 13.—The Navy Department has received the following: NORTH ATLANTIC SQUADRON, U. S. FLAGSHIP MALVERN, BRIGADE, S. C., Jan. 7, 1865.—I have the honor to enclose to you a letter received from Lieut. Comdr. Temple, commanding the late schooner Malvern, which contains interesting information regarding the late failure. It is important as a matter of history, and tells the whole story.

When the former received but 50 to 75 cents per bushel for wheat he had lost money for such luxuries, as tea, sugar and coffee, than even now, at war prices. The recent capture of Wilmington seemed to take everybody by surprise—not that it was impossible, but no one expected it so soon after the recent failure of Gen. Butler. The impression seems almost universal, that the close of the rebellion is not very distant. When that period arrives, there must be a revolution, for which all prudent men should prepare, although that will be followed by a season of prosperity perhaps, unexampled in the history of this country.

GENERAL BUTLER REMOVED. At the request of General Grant, the President has relieved Gen. Butler of his military command, and ordered temporarily Gen. Ord to supersede him. It is probable, however, that Gen. Rosecrans will be eventually appointed. Gen. Butler is as brave and as patriotic a man as lives. He was among the very first to volunteer in defense of the Union, when the great treason developed itself. He was with the Massachusetts troops when their passage was forcibly resisted at Baltimore; and it was to him, more than to any other man living, that Washington was saved. And Annapolis and Baltimore were converted into loyal cities. He is not an educated soldier, never having had the benefit of a West Point term, and on this account may not be a thorough commander of a corps or army; but as a military governor, or as a civil administrator of the laws, the country has not yet produced his counterpart. The President is well aware of this, and we presume that after a short release he will be assigned to some post where these high qualities will be of the great importance to the Government.

MAJOR GEN. BUTLER'S FAREWELL ORDER. Very Latest from Fort Fisher. WASHINGTON, Jan. 17, 9:30 P. M.—Special to the Baltimore American.—After a day's and night's bombardment Fort Fisher is ours, with all the contents of the command. The assault was made by the army and the navy together at three o'clock on Saturday afternoon. One corner of the Fort was secured in an hour, but there was a desperate fight with the garrison, which lasted till one o'clock at night. There was a stern and bloody resistance, and the first assault was repulsed with the loss of 1,000 men. The garrison was then heavily reinforced, and the bombardment was continued till the 13th.
