PROCLAMATION BY THE PRES SIDENT.

WASHINGTON, May 22. By the President of the United States: A PROCLAMATION.

YURREAS, By the proclamation of the President of the 11th day of April last, certain ports of the United States therein spe cified, which had previously been subject to blockade were for objects of the public safety, declared, in conformity with previous special legislation of Congress, to be closed against foreign commerce during the national will to be thereafter expressed and make known by the President; And Whereas, Events and circumstances

have since occurred which, in my judgeestriction, except as to the ports of Galves. In the morning stationed guards in the imestriction, except as to the ports of Galveson, Lasalle, Brazos de Lantiago, Point Isael and Brownsville, in the State of Texas; Now, therefore, be it known that I. Andrew folinson, President of the United States, do rereby declare that the ports aforesaid, not xcepted as above, shall be open to foreign ommerce from and after the first day of uly; that commercial intercourse with the aid ports may from that time be carried a, subject to the laws of the United States nd in pursuance of the regulations as may e prescribed by the Secretary of the Treaury. If, however, any vessel from a for-ign port shall enter any of the before namd excepted ports in the State of Texas she vill continue to be held liable to the penalics prescribed by the act of Congress, ap-roved on the 13th day of July, 1881, and he persons on board of her to such penales as may be incurred, pursuant to the laws f war for trading or attempting to trade ith the enemy.

And I, Andrew Johnson, President of the inited States, do hereby declare and make nown that the United States of America o henceforth disallow all persons trading, r attempting to trade, in any ports of the nited States, in violation of the laws theref, bill pretence of belligerent rights and ate of this proclamation all such offenders ill be held and dealt with as pirates.

It is also ordered that all restrictions upon rade heretofore imposed in the territory of he United States, east of the Mississippi iver, save those relating to contraband of ar, to the reservation of the rights of the 'nited States, to property purchased in the rritory of an enemy, and to twenty-five or cent, upon the purchases of cotton, are moved.

All provisions of the internal revenue law iil be carried into effect under the proper fficers,

As the prisoners marched up the wharf, proceeded by a guard of their captors of the Michigan Cavalry, the tall, spare from of Jeff. Davis, dressed in gray cloths, and wearing a light felt hat, could be easily discerned. As soon as the prisoners were all ashore they were marched up along the beach to the sally-port of the water battery in the rear of the Fortress, and thence to the ceil in the second tiar of case-mates.
