*BE IT ENACIED by the Burgess and Common Councilmen of the Borough of Sunbury, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That if any person or persons, within the limits of the borough, aforesaid, become interiented and disorderly, disturbing the peace, by riotous or other conduct, the Chief Burgess of the said borough be and is hereby authorized, at his own view, or information being made before him, to issue a warrant to cause the arrest of such person or persons so offending against this ordinance, and have the same brought before him, and upon conviction of any such offence, shall forfait and pay such fine as may be imposed by the Chief Burgess of said borough, not exceeding twenty dollars, for the use of said borough, and any person or persons neglecting or refusing to pay the same, with costs of suit, the Chief Burgess is hereby authorized to commit such person or persons to the county juil for each offence, for any period not exceeding sixty days."
