FORTRESS MONROE, May 7 .- The United States Revenue Cutter Northerner, Captain John McGowan, arrived here yesterday morning from Washington, with Secretary McCulloch and family on a short pleasure excursion. They spent the morning in examining the Fortress and other objects of interest, and at 11 o'clock Mr. McCuttoch had an hour's interview with Jeff. Davis, the exact nature of which has not been made known. The visitors returned to Washington the same afternoon.

A gentleman arrived here vesterday from Richmond, Virginia, with several presents to Mrs. Davis from the ladies of Richmond. among which was a black dress and other articles of comfort.

The casemates selected in the Fortress for the accomodation of Mrs. Davis, are rapidly being fitted up in a very comfortable though not luxurious manner. Gen. During the trial, and even at the time of his capture he states that he had a disposition to make a confession, but the yells of the crowd when he first saw them frightened him into the belief that if they knew the extent of his crime all the police in Philadelphia could not save him from their clutch

Probst also states that he did not like to go to the court-room during the trial, as the yells of the crowd when he made his apbearance on the street made a deep and terrible impression on him, and he much pre-ferred the solitude of his cell.

During the afternoon he will be visited by some of the authorities, and it is expected that a minute confession in detail will be extracted from him. He knows that he will never again be

brought face to face with any number of his fellow-creatures, until the day of his execution, and therefore will give to the authorities all the information they desire in relation to the murder.

Although no one had doubted, for a long time, that he was solitary and alone in his devilish work, it is a source of infinite satisfaction to know, from his own lips, that he had no accomplice.


