WILD FOWLS.—Several large flocks of wild geese have passed over this place recently, moving southward. They made a great noise in their flight, and were evidently anxious to reach a warmer climate. Large numbers of wild ducks have also made their appearance, and some of our sportsmen have had an exciting time shooting them on the river, opposite this place, and below the Shamokin dam. The weather-wise consider this early movement of wild fowls a sure indication of extremely cold weather and a severe winter.

THE NEW PAVEMENT AROUND THE COURT-HOUSE will be a handsome improvement. The large sized stones, in front, are well adapted for the purpose, but should not have been patched up with small ones to save a few square feet of stone. The curbing, which is heavy and, perhaps, substantial, is, we regret to say, badly set, but may yet be remedied. It is to be regretted that the whole matter of fencing and paving, around this new and handsome structure, had not been placed in the hands of experienced and competent workmen.

CRIME.—On Saturday night, about 8 o'clock, a colored barber was attacked by three ruffians while on his way to this place from Northumberland, on the river bank, above the Augusta Hotel, in Calk's addition. He was knocked down by the desperadoes, but after a severe struggle made his escape, leaving his hat and a pair of razors lying in the road. His cries attracted the attention of the neighbors, who supposed that the man had been murdered and his body thrown into the river, as they saw marks on the side of the bank, and the person had been dragged over. Next morning the barber made his appearance and claimed the articles found, and, with the exception of a few slight bruises, was uninjured. The affair naturally created a great deal of excitement in the neighborhood.
