THE DOMESTIC COAL TRADE is unusually brisk. The good sleighing and excellent ice bridge over the Susouchanna at this place affords the farmers and others in Snyder and Union counties extraordinary facilities to supply themselves with coal, and the retail coal dealers are overwhelmed with orders. No less than sixty sleds were counted a few days since, waiting their turn to be loaded at the wharves and along the road. Perhaps not less than two hundred sleds and sleighs cross the river

at this place, daily, on the ice.
