IMPORTANT FROM ITALY.

ITALY.

Pavia, Nov. 4.—Evening.—The following intelligence has just been received here from Rome: At 6 o'clock this morning the Papal troops supported by the French forces, attacked Garibaldi at Monte Rotondo and defeated him.

Some reports say that Garibaldi is a prisoner, and others that he was killed. About half an hour after the attack commenced Garibaldi, finding that his retreat was cut off, fought his way to the town of Monte Rotondo, where he was reinforced by some Italian troops, but the French coming to the assistance of the Pontifical soldiers, he was beaten.

The following account comes from another source: Garibaldi was attacked and defeated on Sunday. He retreated and surrendered to the Italians.

Pavia, Nov. 4.—Midnight.—Gen. La Marmora, who was sent to Paris by the King of Italy, on a mission, has returned to Florence, he having failed in accomplishing the objects for which he was dispatched thither.

The ultimatum of the Emperor Napoleon was presented by the French charge d'affaires at Florence, to the Italian Government, on Sunday, and an instantaneous reply demanded.

London, Nov. 4.—Noon.—The Monitor says that Napoleon has sent a note to the French charge d'affaires at Florence, in which he says the Italian advance into the Papal territory is a violation of law and of the treaty, and that Napoleon will not approve of it by word or by silence.

London, Nov. 4.—3 P. M.—It is now reported that the Emperor Napoleon has ordered Victor Emmanuel to expel Garibaldi, and that if he does he will be treated as an enemy.

London, Nov. 4.—Noon.—Bismarck says officially to-day that the Government of Prussia is neutral at present as to the Roman question.
