THE "GAZETTE" AND OURSELVES.

If the editor of the *Gazette* feels uncomfortable under the charge of having voted against Mr. Bisel, he has no one to blame but himself, and we can assure him, from indisputable testimony, that the less he says on the subject, the better. An emphatic denial, in large capitals, may look formidable in print, but will not pass for evidence, in an intelligent community, unless supported by facts. But the facts, unfortunately, are against him. If he did not vote for Mr. Leisenring, and never intended to do so, he has been most unfortunate in the use of his language, and in creating an impression directly the reverse of what he intended.

We never indulge in personalities unless provoked to do so, in reply to personal attacks. We were in possession of what we deemed conclusive testimony in regard to "that report," three weeks before the election, without making the slightest reference to the same in our columns, until the undisturbable attack on ourselves brought it out. His statement, to the effect that he had been anxious, if not itching, for some years past, for an opportunity to pitch into Mr. Leisenring for his persecutions of the *Gazette*, does not tally with his acts, and loses all its force when contrasted with the fact that when such an opportunity did occur, he was entirely oblivious of any such anxiety or itching propensity and thus in his last issue preceding the election, while pitching into the opponents of Messrs. Bright and Fiske, with great vigor, and when Mr. Leisenring ought to have expected utter annihilation, he was permitted to escape without a hair on his head being hurt, or even his equanimity of temper being ruffled by the mention of Mr. Bisel's name.

But our neighbor, in his anxiety to screen himself, ought not to be unjust to Mr. Leisenring, who we know to our cost, has been a warm friend of the *Gazette*, and who did not even support the *Bureau* when first established. Admitting that our neighbor had voted for Mr. Leisenring, under such circumstances, we would not have deemed it the most heinous offence of his life, unless his subsequent denial made it so.

Our neighbor is mistaken in supposing that we claim any superiority. Our modesty is only equalled by his own. Nothing would induce us even to intimate that the Democratic majority in this county was reduced from 1,000 to 400, on our leaving the party, even if we were vain enough to think so. We desire no controversy with any of our contemporaries, and trust our neighbor's future will not provoke any on our part.

Gen. Logan.—The *Seated* copies an article about Gen. Logan and his sister, who it is asserted, called him a liar at a public meeting, on denying that he offered money to her husband to join the rebels. Gen. Logan is a citizen of Illinois, not Ohio, and at the breaking out of the war represented his State in Congress. He was a Democratic and eloquent. He resigned his seat in Congress, joined the Union army, and by his eloquence helped to raise a regiment after his regiment in his State, one of which was commanded by his friend, Gen. Grant, under whom he afterwards served with such great distinction that no one dared to question his talents or his bravery. Yet such is the malignity and stupidity of Copperhead journalism that one of the bravest and most patriotic Generals of the army is thus slandered, because he left his party to fight the rebels and their sympathizers, while such men as Vallandigham and Fernando Wood, well convicted traitors, are held up as model Democrats. Is it surprising that the masses of the Democratic party are charged with ignorance, when such stupid and villainous trash is daily imposed upon them as truths, by the lower order of their journals, which, unfortunately, are the most numerous class?

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
