LENT.—The season of Lent, which is strictly held as a time of fasting in the Catholic and Protestant Episcopal Churches, commenced on Wednesday last, and will continue for six weeks, ending on Easter Sunday, the 12th of April. or kept by him, on the first day of March. Every person failing to make such return by the day specified will be liable to be assessed by the Assistant Assessor according to the best information which he can obtain ; and in such case the Assistant Assessor will add fifty per cent. to the amount of the tax, and from the valuation and enumeration so made there can be no appeal.

In case any person shall deliver to an Assessor any false or fraudulent list or statement, with intent to hundred per cent, to the tax.
