POST No. 105, GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, was organized in this place on Monday last. The following officers were duly elected: Commander of Post—Col. Wm. M. McClure.

MIDDLE CREEK RAILROAD.—A Bill is now pending in the Legislature, authorizing the Company to borrow one million of dollars, and issue bonds, bearing interest not to exceed 7 per cent. per annum. The engineers are now examining the bluffs below Northumberland.

SPRING.—The warm weather that succeeded the severe cold snap of last week, has nearly dissipated the snow in all exposed situations. Approbations of another great flood have nearly passed away. The frost is nearly all out of the ground, and then for the earth has thereby absorbed the waters of the melting snow.

On Thursday noon the ice of the West Branch came with crushing force and moved the ice from the river at this place. The ice was crowded up the bank and into the road at the upper end of town. The river is not high, but the ice is running thick.

ACCIDENTS AT MILTON.—The Miltonian, of the 5th inst., says—Benj. Hendricks was injured at the Catawissa depot on Saturday last, his hand having been caught between the coupling of two cars. It was found necessary to amputate the index and adjoining finger of the injured hand.

ELI B. DREIFUS, an employee of the Catawissa Railroad Co., in making up trains at the depot at this place, was fatally injured on Friday last by being caught between two cars which he was endeavoring to couple. He was horribly mangled, and although Dr. McCreery was called and everything done that could be, he died in a few hours after the accident. The deceased was 37 years of age.

ROBBERS IN NORTHUMBERLAND.—The letter of our Northumberland correspondent was misquoted last week, and did not come to hand until too late for insertion. Among the items is the following, in relation to the burglaries committed in this county, recently.—The night of Wednesday, Feb. 26th, is memorable in the annals of Northumberland for its many cases of house-breaking, there having been four attempts at that species of robbery on that night, the houses of Messrs. Alfred Howley, John McFarland, Peter Vandiling and Dr. McCarty having been forcibly entered. The entrance to all was effected by applying some instrument to the bank end of the front door key, (which had been left in the lock), from the outside. The only plunder obtained by the robbers was about \$3, from Dr. McCarty. Four attempts at burglary in one night! Who says Northumberland is not a growing place?

CONFERENCE MEETING.—The conference from the several counties in this (14th) Congressional District, except Union, met at the Lehigh Hotel, in Harrisburg, on Monday afternoon last, at 2 o'clock. Col. John J. Patterson was appointed Chairman of the convention, and George Berger, Secretary. The following gentlemen appeared as conferees, viz: Northumberland—R. M. Frick, George Wagoner and A. H. Frick.

SPYDER—Wm. G. Herrold, Peter Heigle and John H. Wright. Juniata—Col. John J. Patterson, Col. John K. Robinson and Capt. William H. Patterson. Dauphin—Col. Eli Shifer.

DAUPHIN—J. E. Allen, Col. George T. Hummel and George Berger.

Mr. Allen moved that Col. Eli Shifer be permitted to cast the three votes from Union county, in the absence of his colleagues.

Mr. Shifer asked to be excused from doing so. He said that he had received no notice of the place of meeting, and presumed his colleagues were similarly situated.

The motion of Mr. Allen was agreed to, but Mr. Shifer declined to vote for them.

The Convention then selected J. D. Cameron and A. E. Fiske as the Congressional delegates to the biennial Convention, with power to substitute.

H. H. Beeble, of Juniata county, and W. Cook Johnson, from Union, were selected as alternate delegates.

Com. vs. P. S. Vanhorn.—Adultery. True bill. B. S. Wolverson, prosecutor. Defendant was found guilty. Not yet sentenced.

Com. vs. Amanda Shoffstall.—Adultery. D. Troutman, prosecutor. No bill, and prosecutor to pay costs.

Com. vs. George W. Lehman.—Recognition of defendants, and bail Jeremiah Lehman, on proclamation, forfeited.
