GRAPE.—The late severe winters have demonstrated that most of the present varieties of grape must be abandoned, and that none but the most hardy should be planted. The vines of the old, and what we considered comparatively hardy vines, have been killed partially and entire, such as the Catawba, Croveling and Diana. The Catawba has had its day. The most reliable and hardy, as well as one of the very best grapes, is the Concord, and beyond all question the grape for this country. The Delaware, though small and of slow growth, is our finest flavored grape, and with us has proved hardy.

IMPORTANT ARRANGEMENT.—An arrangement of much importance to the coal, iron and lumber interests of this State, has been consummated between the several canal lines on the Susquehanna river and its branches, embracing the Wyoming canal, the West Branch and Susquehanna, the Pennsylvania, and the Susquehanna and Tide Water canals. They respectively bind themselves to operate their canals on one line on all through tonnage, to provide all the tonnage of the State, and to receive the same at the spring of 1887 to six feet depth of water. It is estimated by the parties interested that the above arrangement will effect a reduction of one-half on the vast tonnage of anthracite and bituminous coal, lumber, and iron.—Chittenden Republican.
