It is observed in California that the Chinese make great use of the telegraph, though it there trausmits messages in Eregish alone. To day great numbers of fleet steamers amounted by Chinese merchanta, and used by them exclusively for the transmission of early intelligence. If the telegraph we propose, counceting all their great scaparts, were now in existance, it is believed that its business would pay the cost within the first two years of its successful operation, and would steadily increase thereafter.
