Different ways of Cooking Fish. In the selection of fish, make sure that the eyes are full, the gills height red, and the flesh firm and still. If the flesh is flabby, the eyes sunken, and the gills of a dark color, the fish is stale. They should be thoroughly cleaned when first procured, and washed in just sufficient water to cleaned them. If much water is used, the flavor will be diminished. Sprinkle selt in the inside, and if they are to be broiled, add paper, licen then in a cool place till you wish to cook them. Fresh water fish are ant to have an earthy taste, which may be removed by soaking them in salt and water after cleaning. Most kinds of sait fish should be roaked in cold water ten or twelve hours before
