Death of Marshal Prim. The violent death of Juan Prim, General, Governor of Madrid, Governor General of Cuba, Marquis de los Castellejos, Count of Reus, Minister of War, and almost the Warwick of Spanish politics, is a more important event than any other so purely personal that has happened in Spain since Isabella's flight. And though we cannot anticipate its consequences certainly, it cannot fail to have results. The future marshal was born at Reus, December 6, 1814. His family were so far from having the hidalgo strain that his birth always militated against his preferment. He entered the army, and flashed his maiden sword in behalf of Maria Christian, regent, in 1833-37, and was promoted therefor. He was implicated in the Saragossa rebellion of 1841 against Espartero, and fled to France, from whence he returned the next year and was chosen deputy to the Cories. He went into opposition with the Queenmother and got up successful rebellion, by which he won his countship and generaley. Then, in a contest between the people and throne, he was equally avoided by both for former duplicity, and, under the able administration of Narvaez, he was impri-soned and subsequently exiled. He fought with the Turks against Russia, in the Crimea; was recalled to the Cortes in 1854, and held firmly to the progresista party. He was a leading general in the war against Morocco in 1856-69, and won his marquisate by his successful bravery. Sent out with the Spanish contingent to

MOUNT CENIS TUNNEL COMPLETED. This great achievement was completed last week. The tunnel was opened through from one side to the other of the mountain, thus uniting France and Italy. This wonderful feat of engineering was begun in 1856. The tunnel is nearly eight miles long; it passes under three mountains, and its cost was 170,000,000 francs, low wages having been paid to the workmen.
